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Campfer, is reached, and at the village of that name, beyond the lake, the road divides, leading straight forward to St. Moritz Dorf (6,090 ft.), the upper village, or to the right to St. Moritz Bad (5,805 ft.), down by the lake, the fourth and last of the series, in the valley below. It is needless to expatiate on the attractions of this wellknown resort, which is a centre of fashionable activity in summer and winter alike. To the cycling tourist it is chiefly noteworthy as a place where he can find a cycle-shop, if need be, and buy English newspapers; but as a place to stay at it is less desirable than any in the vicinity. St. Moritz is essentially "dressy," and the wheelman will have to blush for his clothes if he puts up at one of the huge and hideous hotels which have ruined the beauty of the place, both at the Dorf and the Bad. One does not know whether to be amused or saddened at the way in which Dame Fashion has invaded this mountain home, the social atmosphere of which is that of Paris, and wholly incongruous with that of Nature herself.

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
